<b>Country</b>	<b>Advisory committees</b>
Czech Republic	2 committees, one on technical matters and one on designation.
Estonia	A designation committee with three expert sub-committees
Finland	An advisory council
France	A designation committee
Germany	No comparable committees
Hungary	Heritage Grants Board (2 tiers) which advises on grant allocation a) Commission headed by the Minister of Culture with 13 persons appointed by the Minister; b) 16 professional boards each covering different specialist areas (e.g. Historic Buildings, Fine Art etc) composed of 5-12 people
Italy	A technical expert committee.
The Netherlands	An advisory committee, more political than technical but advises on every designation
Norway	None
Poland	2 committees, a council for cultural heritage protection and an academic advisory panel.
Portugal	Advisory council with responsibility for confirming designation
Slovenia	2 committees one for strategy and one for academic technical advice
Sweden	An 'administrative board' which is an advisory committee.
England	An academic and technical advisory committee and 8 technical panels.
Northern Ireland	2 statutory advisory committees: government appointed professionals each with 15 members Historic Buildings Council - listing Historic Monuments Council – scheduling
Scotland	Historic Environment Advisory Council for Scotland advises ministers
Wales	Advisory Committee to advise assembly

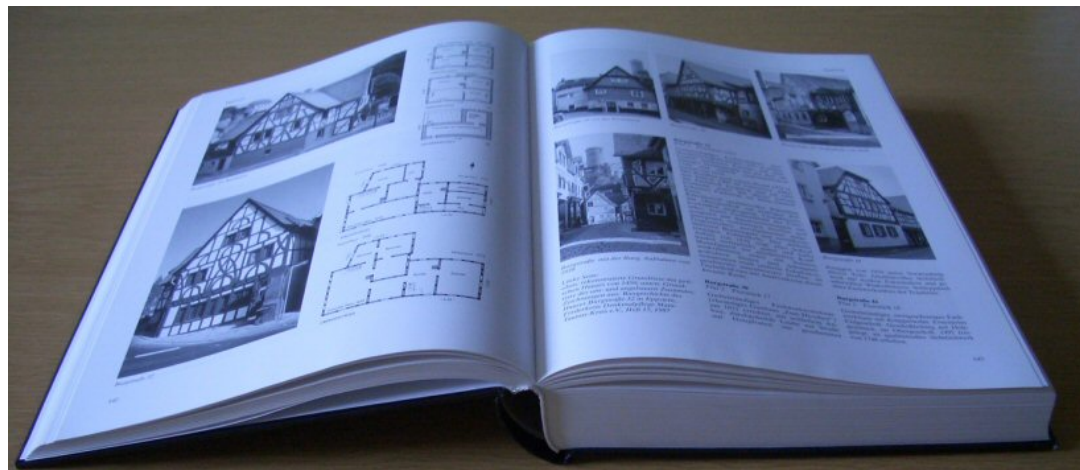

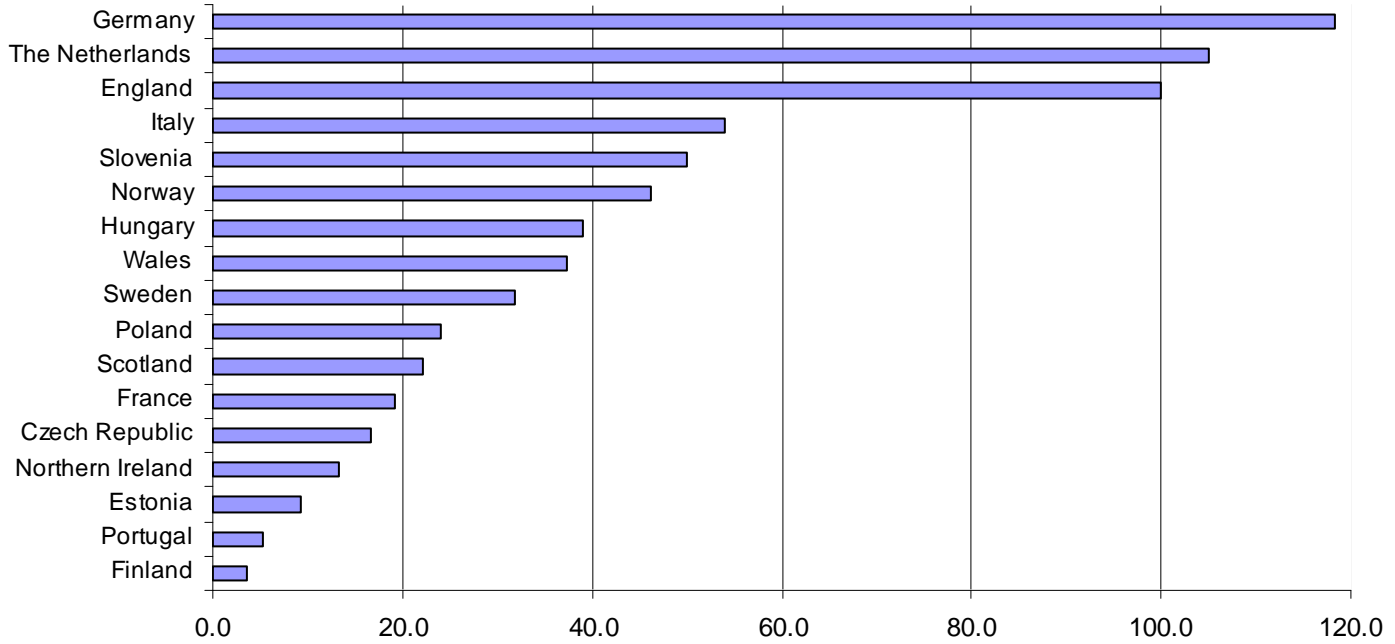

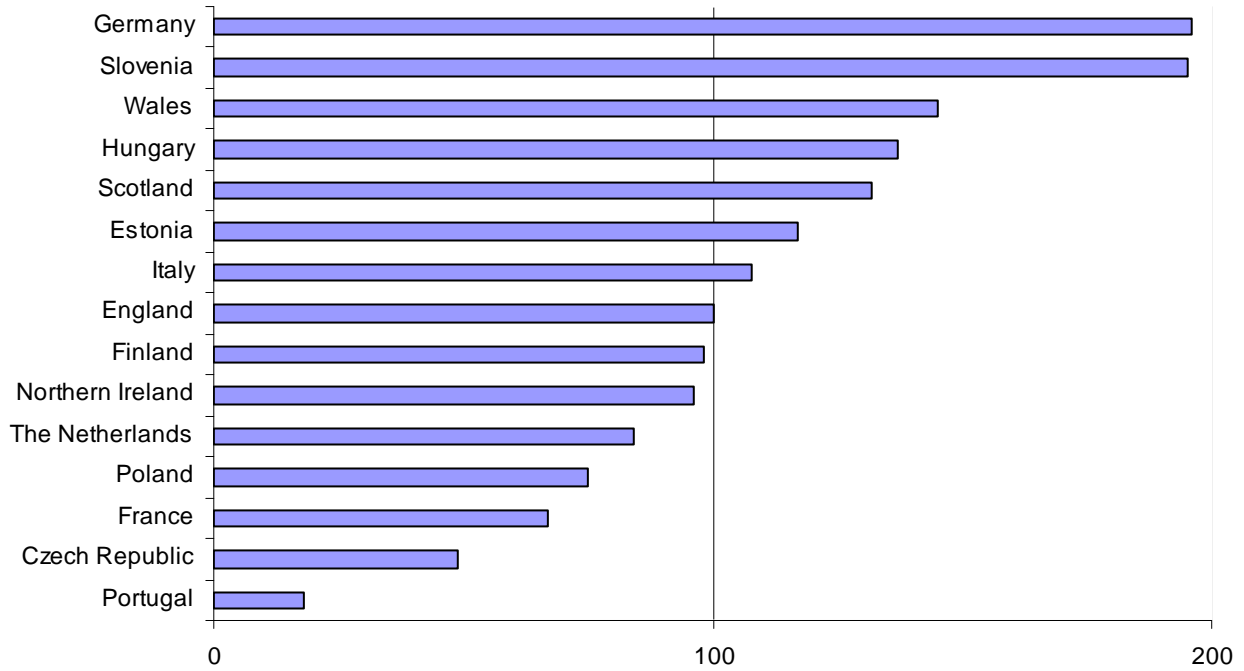




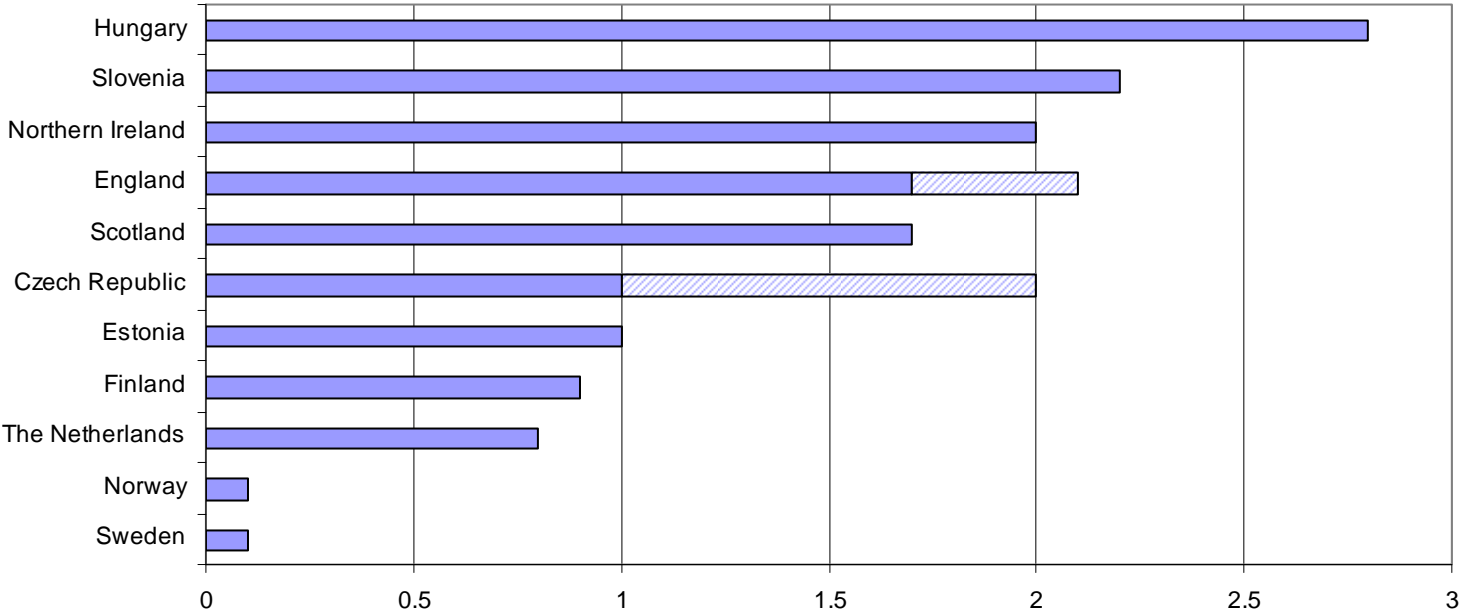
Protected sites per square km (Index England=100)

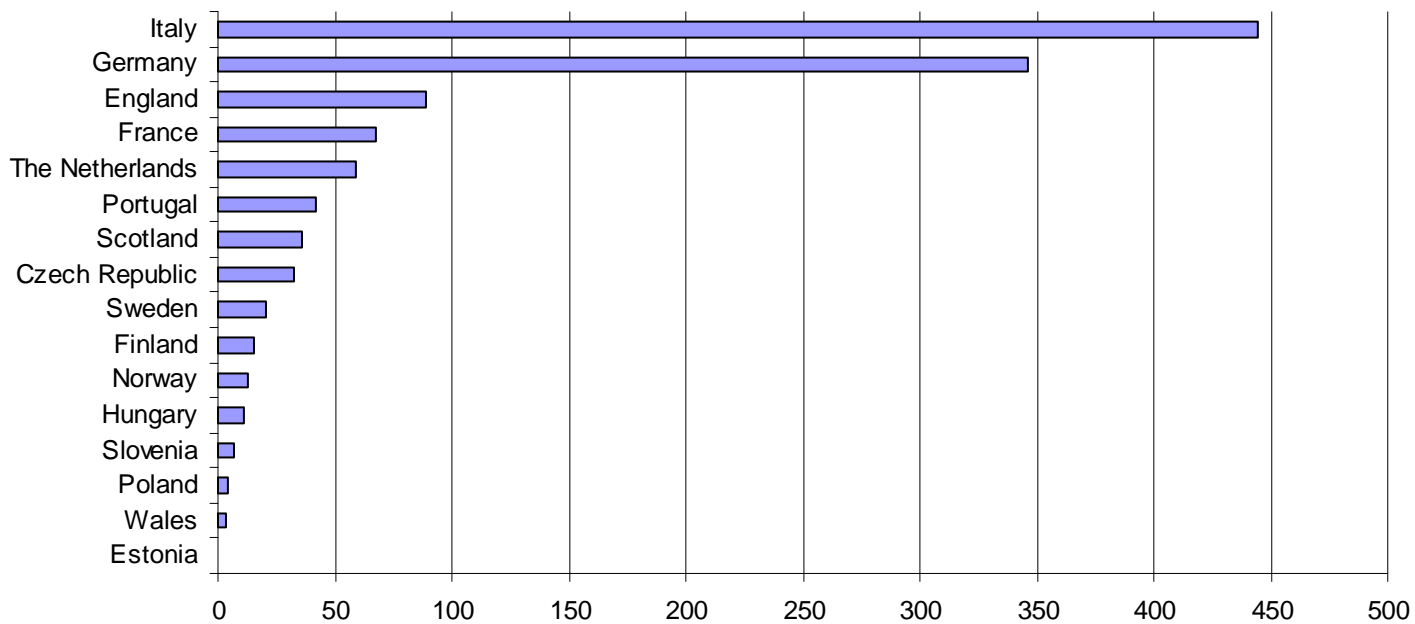

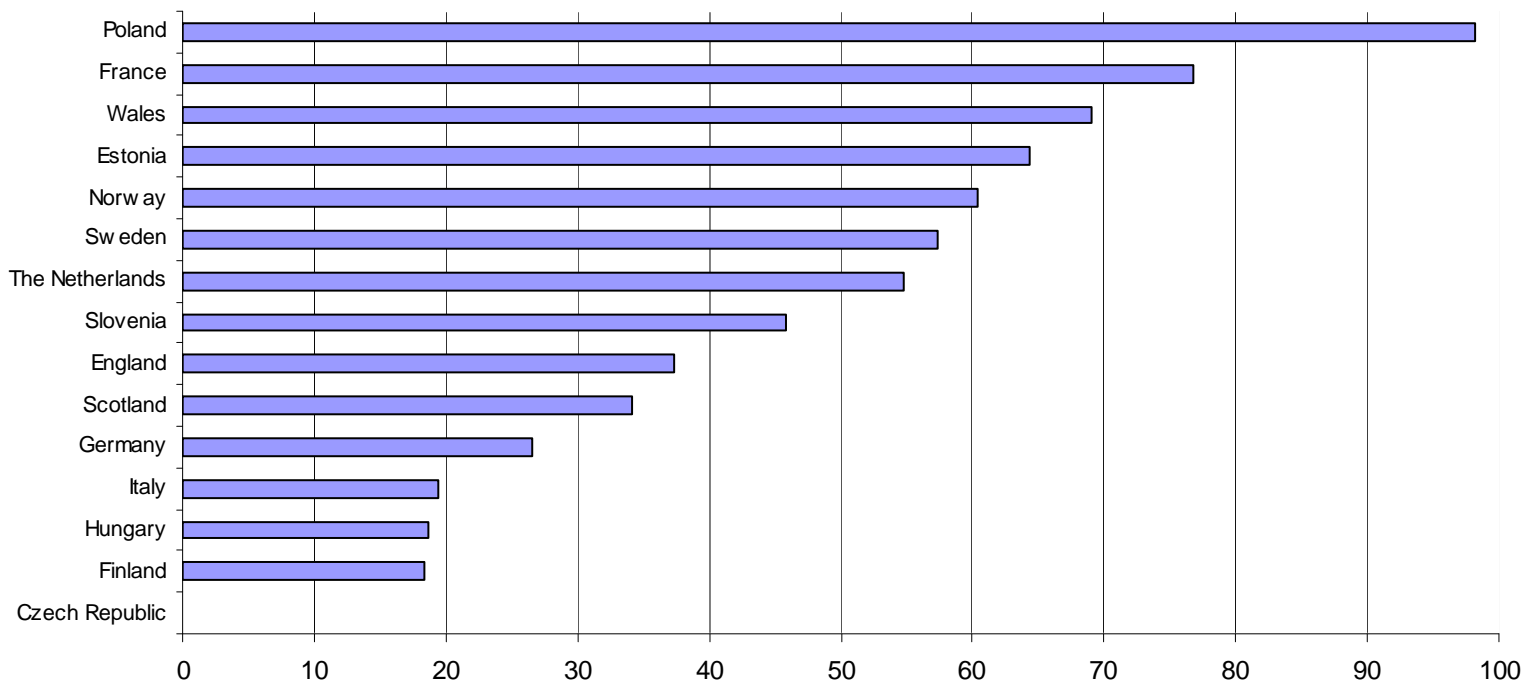

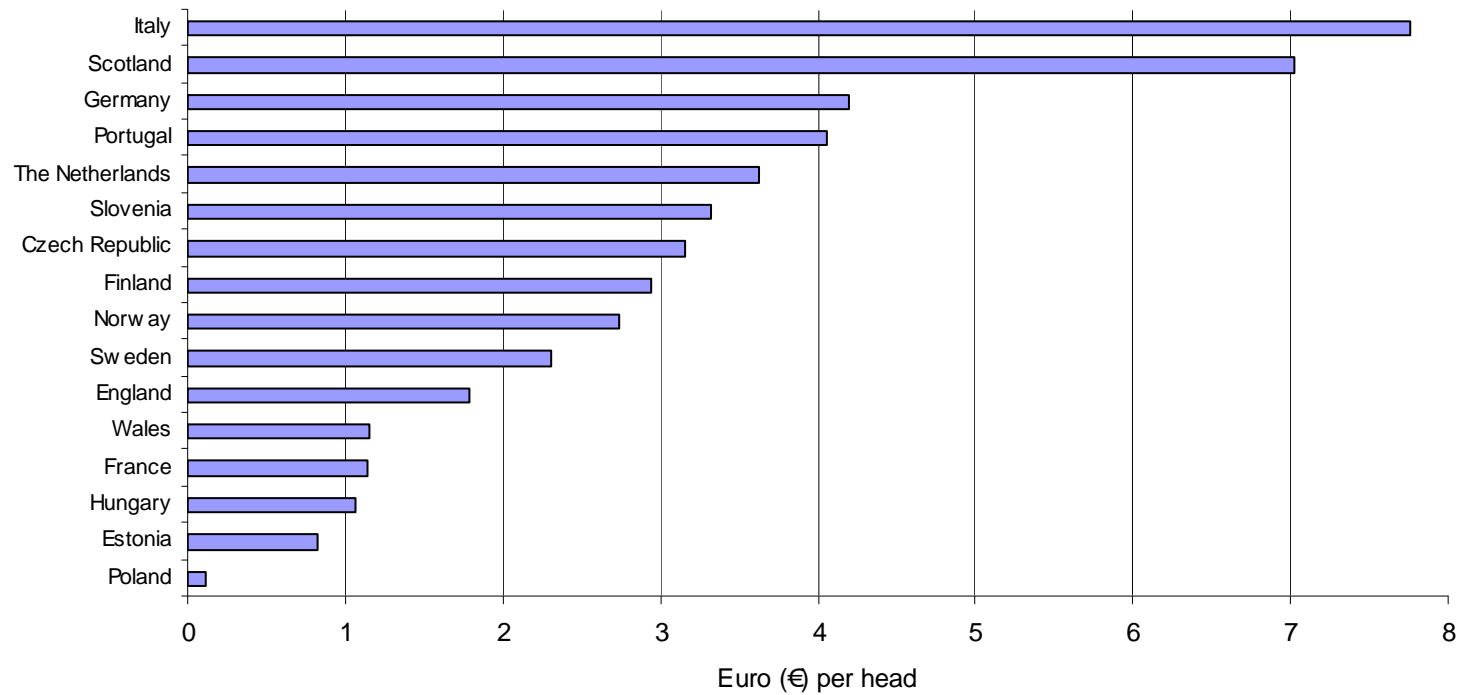
**Adjusted budget (€m)**  
*excluding Northern Ireland (no figures)*



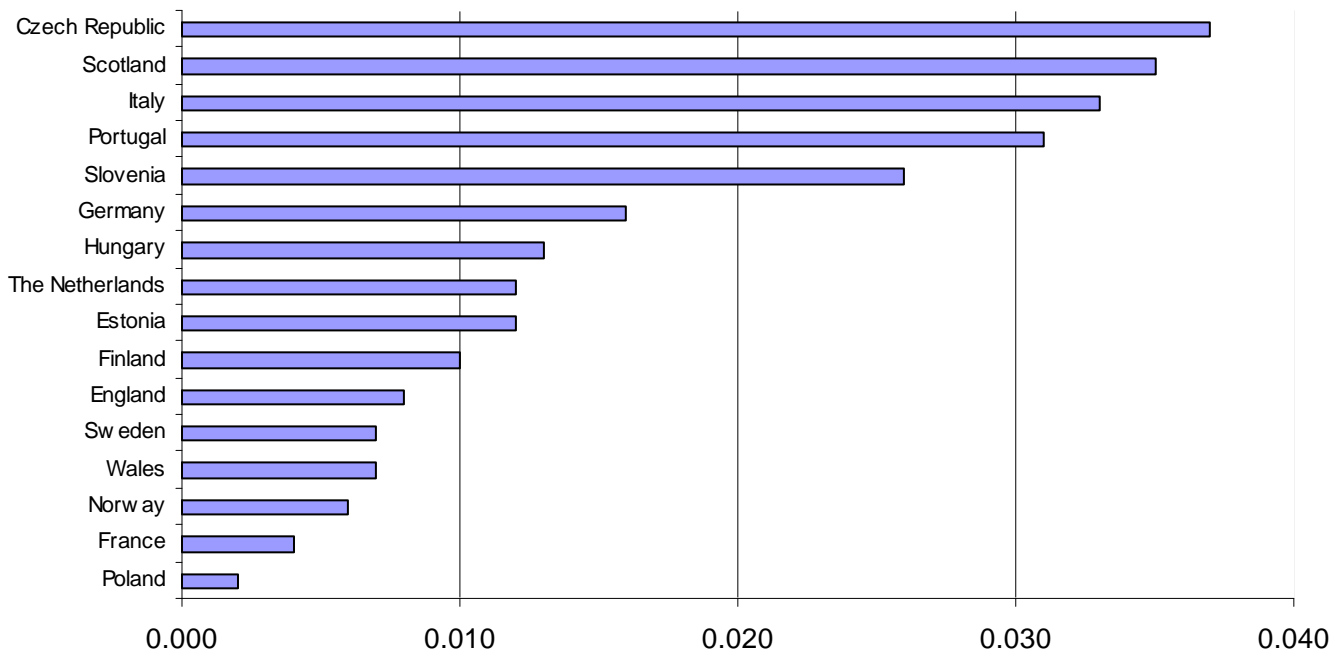
**Grants as % of budget (less property management)**
