Resources inherited from the past in all forms and aspects: **tangible**, **intangible** and **digital** (born-digital and digitised). This includes:

- Monuments, sites, landscapes and natural sites
- Skills, practices, knowledge and expressions of human creativity

- Collections conserved and managed by museums, libraries, archives
- Film heritage

- Highlight the best means to ensure the conservation and safeguarding of cultural heritage and its enjoyment by a wider and more diverse audience;
- Promote cultural heritage's contribution to the economy; and
- Promote cultural heritage as an important element of the relations between the EU and third countries.

Management of the Year at European level

- Joint effort of European Institutions: Commission, Parliament, Council of the EU, European External Action Service (EEAS), Committee of the Regions and European Economic and Social Committee (EESC).
- With DG Education and Culture in the lead it will be a Joint effort of different departments of the Commission, focusing on: education, regional development, social cohesion, environment, tourism, research etc.





Management of the Year at European level

The Commission is assisted by a **Committee of** stakeholders, composed of 35 representative organisations.

International organisations including UNESCO, ICOM, ICCROM, the Council of Europe are also closely associated.





Initiatives at European level

- Transnational projects
- Numerous events, starting with the launch of the Year at the European Cultural Forum on 7-8 December 2017
- Communication campaign: visual identity, website, Eurobarometer survey, communication toolkits etc.

Total budget of 8 million euro (€1m in 2017 and €7m in 2018)





Transnational projects and funding at European level:

- A call for projects will be launched under the Creative Europe programme
- Funding for cultural heritage will be available through different EU programmes: Erasmus+, Horizon 2020, COSME, Europe for Citizens and EU structural and cohesion funds
- Ten European initiatives will assure the legacy of the Year

Ten European initiatives

- Each initiative will cluster a number of projects and actions
- They will be implemented by the European Commission in collaboration with key partners (Council of Europe, UNESCO, ICCROM and ICOMOS)
- These ten highly-visible initiatives will ensure the legacy of the Year after 2018
- They answer four main objectives, defining what European cultural heritage stands for...

Ten European initiatives under four objectives

Engaging

- **Shared heritage:** bringing Europe's cultural heritage, history and shared values closer to people
- Heritage at school: discovering Europe's treasures at an early age
- Youth for heritage: engaging the younger generation

Valuing

- Heritage in transition: re-imagining industrial, religious or military sites
- Tourism and heritage: promoting sustainable cultural tourism

Protecting

- Cherishing heritage: developing quality standards for interventions in the historic environment and at heritage sites
- Heritage at risk: fighting against illicit trade in cultural goods and managing risks at heritage sites

Innovating

- Heritage-related skills: enhancing education and training for the traditional and new professions
- Heritage for all: fostering participation and social innovation
- **Science for heritage:** using research, innovation, science and technology for a better conservation and presentation of heritage
